Dear Susan & Geoff. Thank you for letter rec'd.  
yesterday - posted Jan: 27<sup>th</sup>. Sorry you did not  
get the letter written at Xmas. It was so won-  
derful you came to Bar. arrived on Xmas  
Day, + ours came a few days later. We had  
not heard of Hazel's Mother's death. I forgot  
her married name - she did not write to us,  
she was over here visiting us when we were  
children, so we don't seem to know her well,  
tho' we heard she had given up her son to the  
husband's family. Geoffrey is very fond of  
his Canadian gloves. They are so warm & com-  
fortable for him & came just when most  
needed - for we have had cold weather since  
Xmas, + more snow than usual. Brian  
Turvey writes the snow is very deep at Leeds  
it has broken down telephone & telegraph  
wires & poles. We have had frost all week  
& fine hail & slight snow storms, - a very short  
& sudden thunder storm one night - wh. we  
thought at first to be an aeroplane attack-

but were pleasantly surprised to find it  
only a thunder storm with very brief light-  
ning. We had the other attack a night or  
two after but it too was soon over & no one  
injured. Had a few houses suffered.

Sat - March 1<sup>st</sup>. We find the longer daylight a  
very great help. On Thursday night we were  
just going to bed when I heard water drop-  
ping in the kitchen, & we found a pipe  
was leaking - so Edith & I took a torch & our  
coats & mittens & went to Dr. Langley to ask  
if one of his sons could come to hammer up the  
pipe. - he very kindly came himself in a  
short time - it was very dark no light  
anywhere & we had to have our torch covered  
with paper so that it would not be too bright.  
He knocked up the pipe & said he would  
come next day to put new piping in, & we  
went to bed but at last about noon  
we found the pipe had leaked in several new  
places & the carpet was soaking wet! & had  
to be dropped up & taken into the wash house  
& I went again for Dr. Langley who came soon  
& put new piping in. The carpet is still very

wet - Auntie spring cleaned the kitchen.  
so that is done. Tomorrow Harold is going with  
Barbara to see his brother Ray - who has been  
very ill with pneumonia & Auntie E. is going in the  
car with them to see 'Auntie' Lertie & Auntie D-  
& I am looking after the two children. They  
expect to be back by 6 o'clock. We have had  
very high winds lately, but rather warmer -  
showery. The ship load of onions from Egypt  
when it arrived was in such a bad condition  
that shopkeepers would not buy them! However  
probably soon more may arrive - we always  
like the Egyptian onions. No soup, honey, marm-  
-malade, lard, & many other things this week -  
but various jams & turned fruit & salmon.  
& we got  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb cheese, & our usual rationed  
goods & to our surprise we got eggs! we have  
not had any for a long time. Eggs they say  
are to be had less than 3d each all summer.  
Carrots & potatoes & oatmeal & oats are plenti-  
-ful & we have plenty of tea do it is not too  
bad. Flour 7 lbs for  $10\frac{1}{2}$ d - quite cheap. but we  
are asked to use more potatoes & less flour.

We plan to go & see Bruce on Sat<sup>5</sup>,  
Harold is taking his Radio to a shop there  
to get new valves. Hitherto we have had our  
baths in daylight, as it is not comfortable to be  
in the bath where the guns begin to fire. !!  
But last week we have had them at night,  
without being troubled. Your letter was opened  
by Censor. It is all right but naturally causes  
delay. I think another letter should arrive  
any time now. It is wonderful how they  
come as they do. Norman felt rather un-  
easy & went to see Dr. who assured him  
that he is quite all right & no sign of the can-  
cer returning - so he is very thankful.  
All are all quite well. Very sorry for all  
the many poor folks who have lost their  
homes & possessions. The poor Poles have  
been & are being so persecuted.

I hope you are having better weather  
now. With dear love - hoping all  
are well.
