Feb. 6th 1941

Dear Susan & Geoff. No further letter from you, but one day come soon. There does not seem much news. We are glad to have longer daylight. Geoffrey is well & out again. Barbara still has a bad cold, but is out & about. I still go there every day, her woman's child has measles so she cannot come to work for Barbara for a fortnight. Barbara has been having her two mornings a week lately. We have had more snow but it did not stay on the ground & the rain yesterday washed it away. Brian gives us his Free Press & we find these very interesting & send them on to Captⁿ Cox sometimes - he sends Brian Mae Lear's paper. Dr. Discos' housekeeper & a friend of hers were up yesterday & told us all about his last illness & death - he would have been 98 in May - he left everything to his housekeeper we think - house, money etc. She had been many years with him & had

been very good to him, making him comfortable & looking well after the house - She has had a naval man billeted on her & has found him the greatest help, he helped in Mr. Nixon's few days illness & saw to everything for her afterwards - he got up coal, swept snow away & was invaluable - he pays 30/- per week & has all meals there. So with things at present price it does little more than pay expenses but she is very glad she has him as he is so helpful. We are still having quiet nights & days. There have been no warnings there has been no firing. Harold is a fire-watcher at us this road one night a week & also has to firewatch over the little bank by the station some nights. Elizabeth runs about & gets into mischief. She gets into the safe where the food is kept, & climbs on tables - pulls things out of drawers where open & then stuffs them in again - tries to turn on the gas taps on the oven. She always finds occupation for herself & is full of movement. She is by no means house trained yet!!

Sat³ This morning a letter from you & one
from Sadie arrived & were very welcome
indeed, & this afternoon another letter came
posted Langbank Jan: 13th with Susie's
surprise news in it, I am so glad you are
keeping so well, & hope you continue all
through, how pleased the other children
will be at the news arrival. Tom must
be quite a big boy now & able to help in small
ways, I am glad you have efficient help.
I expect Amaret will soon learn to ride when
warmer weather comes - does she have a
saddle? & is the pony quite quiet & used to
children. I hope the washing machine
comes up to expectation when tried out.

You will know Bill this summer Geoff -
are you keeping your present help?
Eggs are now 3/6 per dozen - rather a differ-
ence to yours!! We think twice before using
one in a pudding. Meat is more plentiful
but the ration remains at 1/2 per person
per week. Beef Steak is 1/10 & Steaming Steak
n 1/4 per lb. Sheep's liver 1/10 per lb - The Cheaper

Cuts of meat need longer cooking & that usually means more gas or electricity to cook it. Bread is subsidized & costs 5/- per 2 lb loaf - we are shortly to have wholemeal bread & later a white loaf with special added products to make it more sustaining. I go to Barber's every day to help a little. On wet days the children have so many tops out, & pieces of paper, cardboard boxes etc. they take some clearing up. Elizabeth loves to empty a drawer onto the floor, & then stuff them all back again - it keeps her happy & busy for quite a time. She goes to sleep about 11 o'clock for an hour - & Geoffrey has a rest after dinner tho' he does not sleep, but lies down & looks at his books. I agree with you Geoffrey that for people like Hitler or Mussolini nothing but superior force is any use. England did everything possible in the appeasement line & all Hitler's promises have been broken time after time. It does not do to have Dictators or Kings with unlimited authority. A Parliament of some kind is necessary to prevent these wars.

I don't think the ³ bulk of the
Italians wanted war & probably
some of the Germans but the
latter have always been army
riders & have caused five
wars of late years - we are
glad the U.S. are helping -

Barbara & Hevold & chil-
dren are coming to dinner to-
morrow - we are having a beef
steak & kidney pie - We have
had nice quiet nights for some
time now & we are indeed

thankful. So many innocent
solutions have suffered under Hit-
ler & Mussolini - Our armies
in the Dardans & wifg the Greeks
are doing very well. I wonder what
they will do with so many pris-
oners. It is cooler now & rain
drools mornings. All will soon be
busy on the allotments. This year
I expect onions will be more grown,
we have had none for so long, but
carrots have been excellent & cheap.
