Dear Queen & Geoff. Thank you for two letters rec'd one on Monday with welcome photos & the other this morning. We all enjoy seeing the photos, & I send three to Auntie, so Margaret & Jack will see them & these. Tom looks so sturdy, he walks so well & so small some children usually do not. I think it is because here they are so much in prams, they don't get so much time to try to crawl & walk. Amareh & Barbara do not seem to alter much, but Barbara looks thinner I think. Geoffrey looks pretty much the same & the photo of you is wonderful. I am glad you all had a happy day at Lake, you do not say if it was hot, here it has been very cool, I have had a hot water bottle on Monday!! Oh it is warm outdoors until evening, then there are few days warm enough to sit out for long. & it has been very showery. I sowed some flower seeds about a week ago & they are coming up well, they are for next year - Lupins, Blue Flax, Canterbury Bells, Poppies, Cuckoos, etc. I hope your rose tree continues to

do well, I had one Rugosa rose (pink) & it grew so big, we had to take it away. It had very big thorns, & we could not pass without getting hung up on the thorns. This year the roses have been lovely & the tall white lilies & now the white Phlox. Geoffrey bathes or paddles most days, & loves it. Bar flies with him & sits down while he plays in the water. Aunties come back tomorrow (Sunday) & that is when I am writing this evening. Fruit is plentiful this year - strawberries, raspberries & apricots.

Capt. & Dr. Cox went to Chester from Drem on Wednesday to see Brian & very kindly took him a basket of strawberries. Chester is a great place for strawberries, great quantities are grown there. & Nah a pity wheat is so low, but prices are always changing. There was a black out on Thursday night, & all the A.R.P. people were out practising - putting out fires, incendiary bombs, decontaminating after gas, & attending to casualties during an - balanced air raid. Some people have had their cars fitted up to carry two stretchers (with patients) on top of the car (outside). But I should

I think it must be difficult to lift stretcher cases so high. Firms having 25 or more em-
ployees have to provide bomb proof shelter
for them. It does seem a mad world.

& so did the others. I have just been to Darr's to tea,

Bar sent me my dinner on Friday, I had been
out shopping with Geoffrey in the pram, &
a deluge of rain came so that I got very wet
feet, & my hat was soaking so I came home
to change after taking Geoffrey home, he was
quite dry with the hood up & a blanket over
over the rest of the pram. Rough seas have
presented the raising of the Shetles, it is calm
& they get prepared & suddenly up comes the wind
& they have to stop. I think Dr. Dalton is taking
