Dear Susan & Geoff - We came here on Sunday - Harold came to see if there was room for us on Sat<sup>dy</sup> & we packed up hastily & came the next day. It is very peaceful here tho' we hear sirens & planes etc. each night. We are right on Ornel Farnmore, & it is very beautiful, mountains & hills all round. It is lonely & the nearest shop is about 1/2 hour walk & there only a little village one - We have one <sup>large</sup> bedroom & sitting room, the walls are stone & mortar very thick. The children are very pleased with the country, but not



with the gander! Capt<sup>n</sup> Cox told  
we are very glad we came away as  
the anxiety about the children  
was so great. No post today & we  
could not phone or wire to ask how  
people are. I am hoping Aunties  
did get to Akworth the day after  
we came away. We shall be very  
thankful to hear. The lanes up  
to here are steep & stony, so not  
fit for a team, so we cannot  
take Baby down to the village.  
Capt<sup>n</sup> Cox told Brian they had  
not heard from Laugbark for  
over a month - but they may  
have done so now. I regret some  
of my letters will be lost to  
you - but we both know we  
shall write as usual every  
week. Harold expects to come at  
the week end - he may go to



S'port for a day or two but regrets  
mostly to be at no 3. Sorry I had no  
ink for finish part of letter. We hope not  
to have to stay very long here - there is  
so much we could be doing at home -  
the peas were coming up well & the  
onions but we have had to leave every  
thing to its fate. Letters will be redirected  
here. I had a nice long letter from  
Brian on my b. day. I am 75 years  
old now & don't able to do very much  
but everyone thinks us all much  
younger than we are, as we are all  
quite active. Auntie Dr. is a little lame  
with rheumatism in one leg. The air  
here is doing us all good - if only we were  
free from anxiety about the others.  
Thursday Had a letter from Aunties  
they are at Norman's & he took them  
with car at Wakefield & so they finish-  
ed their journey comfortably - I  
had a very nice letter from Brian



also today - & one from Auntie N.:  
they have been having a trying time  
there. The newspapers are growing  
less & less in size & print & news.  
Harold expects to come on Sat<sup>o</sup> until  
early Monday morn<sup>g</sup>. probably. We hear  
the cuckoo every day. & the trees are  
beautiful. It is very pretty everywhere  
- so many small farms dotted about.  
It is difficult to get food for the animals  
& fowls. We have a very kind landlady  
& she cooks well & does not mind trouble  
in doing up meat. There are three girl  
waitresses here - they have been here a  
year, & never been a day ill or in bed.  
They look splendid. I cannot give  
you much news - we have to be like the  
wise monkeys! I will get this posted  
early as I don't know if it will  
take longer than from home -
