

5 Centurion Drive, Meols. December 18th, 1928.

Dear Susan & Geoff. Thank you for letters re-
ceived on Monday. I wrote you Geofrey last
week for your birthday & hope you rec'd it safe-
ly. You are well into your winter, but ours
has only begun today when we woke to find
the windows frozen in places & a bitter east
wind. I went to Chorley, they were having
a special service conducted by Clubbeesey,
they sang the hymns, read Scripture
portions & prayers. in spite of the weather
the church was well attended. Mr Dalton
was there & spoke a few words but there was
no sermon. It was nice to see so many chil-
dren. Pollie's brother Charlie died last
Monday & was buried on Tuesday. There was
service in Upnor Church, Auntie G. went to
it. Her remaining brother Fred came from
London, his wife is ill with pneumonia at
present. I had a very nice letter from
Brian & will enclose it - we go to see him
on Wednesday. I do hope the weather will

be different to today - it is the N.E wind still
is so trying. I am very thankful for the very
warm Combination Aunties gave me. Sheep
do make a difference. Harold & Barbara have
given me a beautiful cyclamen with rose
Coloured flowers, & Jo Lytle brought Aunties
some daffodils & gave me two bunches of
violet. I gathered about a dozen roses
on Thursday - lucky I did for they would
have been ruined with this wind & frost.

I wonder if you are having a turkey or goose for
Xmas. Norma & Jeanne are bringing Aunties
a goose, sheep day they are bearing in mind
the dimensions it must not exceed - as the
over could not accommodate a very big
one. I am giving Bear a wishbone
wakes - not a deer one - he has long had a
desire for one. I wonder how Connie May
Gilpin & Charlotte are. One usually sends
a line or two at Xmas time. Baby Geoff is
having a cart on wheels from his Father & Mother
 something like this - he can be wheeled
in it in warmer weather, or he can

wheel turns about in it. He no longer sleeps out of doors, his pace is now too short & now that he gets up (or at least wakes) later, he does not sleep after dinner but goes to bed earlier, it suits better for he can now go out earlier in the aftⁿ: & come in before it gets dark. I take him out every Monday & Friday morn- ing & sometimes in between. - We were all there to dinner today. Barbara had boiled fowl, egg sauce, sausages, sprouts, potatoes & yorkshire puddings. My geraniums are still very gay in the verbiule, I have been shrouding them in newspaper this evening tho' they are pretty hardy. It has been very stormy in the English Channel. Seven days the Skermer went to try to bring ashore the Oddystone Lighthouse keeper without success, but they managed it yesterday. another Lighthouse keeper is ill in the Orseleas Lighth- ouse, & another in Scotland - so far three have not been reached. You will see what Brian says about Dr. Cox. I am glad they are able to come to Bickerstaffe for

Christmas. Have you heard any news
yet of Mollie or the Pozdees? You seem
to have a good many visitors already, Geoff.
It is very quiet, no one about, the dead boughs of
the Michaelmas Daisies knock against the
window with the gusts of wind. I hope you all
had a happy Xmas, & that your family Susan
was able to come. I suppose Harold & Sadie
would be included. The children would
love the stir & commotion & the parcels.
Geoffrey would think of the Christmas
time of his childhood, where there were
five children in the house at Grange Mount.
Now all the birds have flown. I use the
Rattle holder that Amaret made every day
now that I have a fire. I don't need oil for
the gas, as the handles do not get hot.

Well I must now write Lucas' Letters & the
Pyres. Agnes has been so busy every week
sending different little papers to Briar.
