Dear Susan & Geoff. Thank you for your letters, they come now at the beginning of the week instead of the end. I hope you are all quite well. I have not yet received the material, but will of course forward it but may keep it as you suggest until nearer to Barbara's birthday. We are having disagreeable weather yet, it was +1 degrees in the house this morning & the room gets nice & warm by bed time!! Anyways we are more fortunate than the many parts as we have had no snow this week & no floods except that some fields have been under water. Auntie Edith has not been well this week, she had pains in her side & back, they have gone & she is better but has not been out yet - the weather has been damp & often raining. Geoffrey has been out as usual tho' he has ~~not~~ <sup>bladder</sup> been well - we think he got a chill running out in the garden without his warm woolley overalls on. However he has steadily improved & is full of fun today though

his appetite is still poor. Harold has not been well, though he has been at business as usual. There are so many ill at present - flu - & you cannot wonder, it has been so damp & cold. Jack went to the Dr & there is too much sugar in his system - we do not know particulars yet, but he will have to be strictly dieted - he has not been well for some time - having a attack of boils. I had a very good letter from Brian & Dr. Dalton came to see us & he said how much better Brian is - that he would not have known there was anything wrong with him for his face & eyes too were quite normal, & he spoke quite rationally - Dr. Dalton said he may be able to take us to Chester on Wed: in ~~to~~ a friend's car - if the friend is not using the car himself - he has two others of his congregation at the hospital (patients) & he visits them at intervals. Dr. Munroverley still at the time, Muriel says they are very worried about her as to what to do

when she is fit to leave as she doesn't live alone - she wants to come back to her own house, but they know of no one to live with her - she is rather difficult to live with they have almost decided to let the house furnished for a few months, & for her to live with Muriel, there with John, & there with her sister - but she does not get on with her sister. Refugees are gradually being received - but the rules are rather hard - anyone taking a child must agree to look after it, & pay for its food & clothing & school as ~~it~~ would for its own child until the age of 17 unless claimed by parent before there. also refugees if employed as maids must be paid not less than 15/- per week - well there are many families who could give food & a smaller wage to a refugee, but they can do without a maid & have been doing so, & they could not afford 15/- per week & less. This is silly, for English maids won't come can't be got as they prefer other employment so

if it is not doing them out of work & many  
refugees would get good comfortable homes,  
& they could always leave if not com-  
fortable. Brian gives one the Free Press  
after he has read it - he has it all ready  
when I go. I have not written or heard of  
the old letters yet. I have done a good deal of  
knitting this winter. Geoffrey still sleeps  
in their room, he is back to bed & the light  
turned out, he has woken up the last night but  
goes to bed soon after 5 o'clock. He has a bath  
every night. I am having dinner at Auntie's to-  
morrow (Sunday). & also Lees & Well. It is  
Auntie E's B-day on Feb: 2<sup>nd</sup>. We have got the handbook  
~~(Government) for occupations in time of war, they~~  
don't mention anything suitable for people over  
70!! Such a sad lifeboat disaster at St. Ives, Cornwall.  
The lifeboat was one that rights itself if it capsizes, but  
the men say they prefer the older kind wh: this it does  
not right itself, is more stable & does not capsize so  
readily - it was a terrible sea. They were such brave
