

3 Centurion Drive Deoleo Aug: 8th 1940

Dear Susan & Geoff - Thank you for letter
rec'd on Monday - it would seem strange with -
out Amaret for so long. I wonder if she was
homesick at all. How pleased she & Barn-
bara will be to see the little baby cousin.
I wonder if she is to be called Jane or
Elizabeth. I am waiting on the horse while
they are painting it - two men - they clear out
the gutters first, & then put a fresh coat of
paint on after burning off or sandpapering
the old paint - & then put a thin line of
white paint round all the windows, & then
a second coat all round, so I expect it
will take them nearly a week as there
are so many doors to do & windows. It is
to be painted green again. I don't expect
they will paint the railings at the back
because they are so covered with plants

& also some of the wood is rotten, it needs
new but this must last until wood is more
plentiful - We had an air raid warning
last night & dressed & came down for an
hour where the all clear signal was given.
No damage was done here, our aeroplanes
were flying after the raiders. I don't know
if they were brought down. The glass has
fallen & I am afraid we shall have rain,
it is needed but I would prefer the painting
to have dried first. Auntie E. is better, the
Dr. came on Sunday & tested her blood pressure,
he found it normal for her age & thinks
she will soon feel stronger, but she is to
go slow yet & rest in the afternoon -
We have been looking over old things - Greek
- Father's military cloak & coats & enormous
hats surmounted with gold ornaments & plume.
Spaullettes (golden) worn on shoulders -
There was a dagger wh. had been found in a
Slave ship. For some time he was in a

Man of War off the W. African Coast & they
used to try to intercept the Ships laden with
Slaves - they were not allowed to take slaves
before they sailed - sometimes they were successful
- but the slaves were freed - but at other
times they either got away or before catching
up to them a line of sharks would be dro-
-need & when the ship was reached there
would be no slaves on board - they had all
been thrown over the side & the hold of the
ship freshly timewashed. There does not
seem much change in the war situation -
Norman & Jeanne have gone cycling to the
Chiltern Hills, they are staying at a little
country Inn. I hope it will be fine for them
last week was beautiful, but today the
weather seems to have changed - each street
here has an air warden - whose duty it is to
patrol the street & give aid & summon help
in case of fire. Small pumps are used with a
bucket of water which has to be depth filled

at plants

by another helper. The streams will let the water out in a very fine spray, or by a simple action it will come out in a stream. The spray is for the bomb & the stream for any fires that the bomb may have started. But there is talk of a recently discovered powder wh: will put out fires almost immediately. This is not safe to use. See ~~patent~~ no.

extinguishers such as you use - because in a confined space they generate poison gas when used on bombs. I hope you get a very good dog. They do say that female dogs are double more bid-

dable & dependable & not fond of straying -
They only use females for guiding blind persons
& they have to be specially chosen.

Sunday -
We have had several warnings this week usually about 1 a.m. Damage has been done within about 5 or 6 miles & a few people have been killed, but doublely damage. We always dress hastily & come down the hall by the parlor door, & sit on a seat there until the All Clear signal goes, where we go back thankfully to bed.

-Stairs with the children, they don't hear
any near fire. Our aeroplanes quickly
share the German ones & the search lights
which are very vivid help in the search. It is very
windy now & there was no alarm last night.
Aunties have dug out in one corner of their dining
room so will have to have new wood there - for
tunately it is only at the end of one of the boards.
The painters are getting on but this wind will have
covered the paint with smuts & sand however it
was dry before the sand blew. The German news
is not to be relied upon - Sheepfold Dyer was
destroyed - but Russell Heng, they have reason
to dread the place. We are well fortified & defend-
ed & the women of the Dominions & of England
are marvellous, & of course the Navy & Merchant
Fleet. Now some of the men have suffered
in open boats for hours & sometimes days.
I had a very nice letter from Recie this
week. I must go out & tie up some of the
tall plants that have been blown down

by the wind. The second lot of Lettuces is nearly
ready we have just finished the first & we
have had quantities of beans from just a
very few runner seeds. The French beans are
flowering & we have seen some Spinach beet - wh. they
say is a most useful & prolific winter vegetable.
you eat the leaves only. The gardens & country
still look beautiful - it is long since we had
such a fine summer - now it is cloudy but seems
as if it cannot rain. The enclosed comes from
Aunts from Shalee sheep show deer costumes worn
by peasants in the country. I hope you are
all quite well at Langbank. & that the crops
are good, & the garden. Don't be uneasy about
us. England has a way of muddling through -
Our people are more one handed like the Germans,
& are more adaptable.
