It is a good thing Amarah finds her glasses a real  
help. Auntie B. has just got new ones they cost  
£2.7.0 they have the double sight so do for  
reading, sewing etc & for going about the house or  
out walking. The Cheeres will be a great stand by -  
the tiresome to make. Norman when little was  
like Tom on going up the path to stranger's houses  
& also he would sit down in the middle of the road  
if he wanted to go a different way - quite regard-  
less of the dust & his spotted white attire -  
Well the war situation is very serious & seems  
each day to grow worse. we are all hoping that  
help will get to France. she has had so many ene-  
-mies within - The Belgian King was responsible  
for much of the loss & now Italy has joined the en-  
-emies & the Germans don't mind how many of  
their men they sacrifice, they have so many. The  
London school children are being vaccinated, it is  
taking a week. they are going to Devon & Cornwall  
& S. Wales. Prices are rising by degrees - hard for those  
who have very small incomes. such as old age  
pensioners, but they may get additional help in  
August. My foot is slowly getting better, but I  
cannot yet bear to wear an ordinary shoe so I

am wearing the occasions that Mr. & Mrs. Cairns  
gave me when they were here. However I can hobble  
about in the house & soon the bruises will disappear  
the swelling has gone down a great deal. The gar-  
den is doing well - the beans are about 5 feet tall & the  
lettuces are about ready for eating. The roses are  
lovely & the pinks too small so sweet - the air in  
the garden is scented. A lady came round to collect  
walking sticks for soldiers in hospital as they can  
often get about with that help. I gave her the one Daddy  
used - she got quite a lot. Mr. Drummerley's house has  
notices up to be sold. It was Geoffrey's birthday on  
Friday - the 14<sup>th</sup> - he is now 4 years old. he had a very  
happy day he had 5 or 6 little friends to tea, Ann  
Pickershaff among them, it was a nice day so they  
had tea out on the sandhills & played games -  
Mr. Saxby (mother of one of the children) took Baby Eliza -  
Beth<sup>out</sup> for the afternoon & then left her in the pram at  
Aunties & she was brought in nursed, a while &  
then she had a rick on the rug & she rolled over  
& grabbed at the flowers on the carpet. She is a  
very good baby - she has 9 teeth - she does not want  
to sit up at all - tho' she can raise herself up -  
Mr. plan to go to see Brian on Sat<sup>d</sup> instead of Wednes-  
day as Harold says he will then take us in the car

We get there later than usual but as we can stay later it does not matter. I should kindly cut the grass for me on Friday as I could not do it myself. I hope Lena has not gone lame again. I have had a bad luck with his horses + I am sure he is kind to them - Capt<sup>n</sup> Coe is very good going to see Brian + it is quite an expense.
