

3 Centurion Drive - Meals - June 29th (Sat.) 1940

she had called at Langbank on her homeward journey
as well. I did receive your letter saying you had seen
her on her onward journey. I hope you enjoy the motor
cruise it should be a decided help. We are glad you had
good rain & Brigay said by the Canadian paper that
the crops were very promising. The war news continues
increasingly grave - there are a great many foreign troops
in England - Poles, Belgians, French. It is hard times for
the Channel Islanders to have to leave their homes & means
of livelihood. Mr. Philips (opposite Bear) & Dr. Elias up
this road are thinking of sending their girls to Canada
but Dr. Philips' girl is nearly 16 & she is afraid by the
time she is enrolled that she will be too old.
Dr. Elias thinks of sending Paoline. She is about 12
or 13 I think. However first all the children from
the evacuated areas have first chance if their parents
wish them to go & it will take some months before they
can all go & by then perhaps things may be better.
We had a warning last Friday night, I did not hear it.

so went downstairs to the passage close to the pantry
& sat there for two or three hours!! & there hearing
nothing alarming I went back to bed - there was no
firing. Geoffrey has not been well for the last
week, we thought it was German measles as he had
spots out, but he also got a chill after bathing - it turned
suddenly very cold & he shivered & could not get warm
& then got too hot - the Dr. said he had just escaped
jaundice & did not think it was measles. so we

don't really know if he had it - however he is downstairs + out again, but has lost weight + is not quite strong again. He was nearly 5 days in bed. Elizabeth is very well + happy - She has such a smiling face with dimples + is very good, she is beginning to crawl. Our garden is full of beautiful roses pink, white, red, cream, damask, etc. I catch big bunches daily + the white lilies are quite a show. Our lettuces are also a success + the Scarlet runner beans are up to the tops of the fence. The peas also are doing quite well. Harold is busy with his allotment. I have been at Barbara's till day from about 10 o'clock till the children were in bed. Baby does not sleep long in the daytime now, she has a safety strap which goes over each shoulder ^{crossing} round the waist + short straps fasten it to the pram. So she can get out of it + it allows her sufficient freedom without danger. It would be very good for a high chair too, but Bar. has not a high chair. Brian Survey has passed his exam in all the subjects, which is a very great relief. He had so many drawbacks. I guess the reason is that he was afraid it would prevent him from passing. The night before last there was a air raid alarm, & a lot of people had to get up at midnight, which gave people good practice in case it had of been a serious raid. so now when war comes, they will not be taken by surprise of people not knowing what to do.

I really think that our bed
room door should be left
unlocked, or else an outside
stair case in case the warden
got killed or the hall
blocked with debris so that
he could not get along, in
a way sleeping up stairs is
more dangerous than
down stairs, so perhaps people
will start & sleep down
stairs that have room to do so.
