but no damage here I think

Sat-3 Feb. 17th 1941

Dear Susan & Geoff - Thank

you for letter rec'd yesterday
it was dated Jan 20th Laybank,
& had been opened by Censor so
I must have rec'd it without
much delay. I had a letter
from Captⁿ Cox (I had sent him
some Free Press papers) he said
Dorothy was flying to the
Isle of Man this last Thursday
to help look after her Uncle &
Aunt - The Aunt has had a
stroke & one side is paralysed.
She is about 50 I believe, but
has had a hard time nursing
a helpless sister for years.

Capt? & Mrs Cox are in their usual health, & he says he will soon go again to see Brian.

This afternoon two Air Wardens (Mr Goftr & Roy Maxwell) came to see if our gas masks are right. All masks have to be inspected. Harold is taking Geoffrey with him & going to see his Father tomorrow at Southport. They go by car as it is much quicker & pleasanter. The Alert has just sounded. Harold will be on duty as Warden or Fire Spotter. The Ball house has had a small sack of sand delivered to it, & all are expected to have buckets of water ready & bath with water in-

Buds are beginning to dry green
& bulbs are springing up every-
where in the gardens. The snow-
drops are in flower. I am
Knitting a cardigan for Paerbake
& she is Knitting a jumper to cor-
respond - 3 ply orange or deep yel-
low wool & an oz. with deep welt
at waist & rest plain knitting.

The war seems to be spreading,
& we wonder what Hitler is
planning - whether invasion
& gas attack - But mouth of England
has so much windy coast
that gas one would expect to
soon be dispersed - We have had
rain during each night lately -
but fine in the daytime -

Dr. Cheateley died last Sunday,
I expect you remember her, Siff.
She was about 88 years old.

A run in Liverpool has just died
in her 101 year!! I wish ever
could get eggs at the price you
get. It is such a treat to be
able to use plenty of eggs in
Cakes & puddings & no wonder
if they would do with less.
I should think Pearce would
prefer War Bonds but will be
going to see him on Wed:

Living is beginning so I must
stop until it stops - I am glad
you find the washer such a
help. The Heatons are still in
the Isle of Man, they went
there at the beginning of the
war & their bread house

has been empty, but now they
have lent it to some refugees
from Italy. The firing has
ceased again! Auntie E has made
a pretty coat for Elizabeth or
of a baby's sleeping bag for from.
it was made of beautiful fine
blue cloth - a very pretty
shade with white pearl buttons.
it was too good to use for its
intended purpose. + blue
uits her so well. She is very
quick - today when I went
she began to pull at my
coat to get it off - as I take
it off each morning when I go
there. It was a great relief.

to Jeanne to hear her sisters
are safe & well - tho' of course she
cannot write or hear from them.
She heard thro' the Red Cross -
Boiling Fowls are 1/8 per lb. butter
1/8 but only 2 ozs per person can be
bought - though in addition one can
buy 6 ozs margarine 9d. per lb.
The sugar allowance is 8 ozs per
person per week. The children
(2) next door have measles - they
are little girls, 12 & 7 respectively -
they are all going to try to grow as
many vegetables as possible
this year. Onions & Shallots,
they say the latter are easy to grow -
but that onions are more trouble -
Harold has been very glad to have
the allotment, they are getting sprouts
now - they were 7d. per lb!!
