Dear Goff & Susan.

Capt Cox was here last Wednesday, he had just got a letter from Harold, who had been to Broadview to see the King pass. I expect a letter coming on Empress of Britain, I think they must be holding a lot of bags of mail for that ship. The captain in looks is similar to Capt Irvine as I have not had a letter for some time. We have had a week of dull wet weather they had just started cutting hay, so that is the reason for it.

I just said if they did not get rain in laying time, there would be no rain for another month. I think an English hay & batten elevator would be better than a stacker as it will raise the hay 45 feet, & would have to be forked onto the elevator, but could drop like a threshing machine into a pile & just squared off, it is easier to work on

the ground, than walking on loose hay, a  
swept could be used to bring it to the  
picks. In the winter it could be  
set at the base to put the hay in through  
the ventilator at the peak of the roof.  
There will be good fruit crops, I saw a tree  
loaded with cherries, & had some gooseberries.  
Sir Percy Bates manager Cunard White Star Co  
has allowed people to look over the new Mauretania  
at 2/- each, the money going to the relations of  
the sunken submarine, it sails for New York  
tomorrow, & is having tourist as cost ships  
as far as Flanders, the round trip is about 10/-

As I am not allowed to travel on the Mauretania  
I will send this on its maiden voyage.  
I asked the doctor if I could go, as they  
have nearly finished using me, that is the  
King will soon be home.
